



With Covid season in full swing, we had to close our boys basketball group, but we were able to focus on what we could still do. Monday nights continued with an online Bible study with the Congolese teens who chose to join. We studied the first seven chapters of the book of Daniel and were able to focus more deeply on the text. We also took time to pray together and follow-up on personal needs.

We tried to help teens with their online school work. Many of the kids lacked motivation or computers to login, but some of the teens worked hard to learn even without the accountability of their teachers. I tried to pair homework helpers with each teen who needed help, but this venture did not pan out very consistently and fizzled out before the school year ended. A ministry called Global FC did a great job in the education space back in the spring.

In April and May we were able to serve the ministry of Agape Pamoja in fixing houses for refugees. Each Saturday a small group of volunteers did small projects like demolition, yard work, and trash pickup. Many of the neighborhood teens worked alongside us in serving. It was a lot of fun!



We also had time to gather online for a few different prayer sessions weekly with other ministries like Freedom Hoops. This was a very healthy use of the time. Four interns from Refuge KC partnered with us through the summer. We also had a chance to follow up with different people we know during Covid isolation. The believers living in our house spent a lot of time with our neighbor from Iraq who was here alone while his family was stranded in Iraq. God uses each of our situations for His Glory.



In June, things started to open up and we had an eventful summer. We had a kids club at Hilltop apartment complex where older teens that we have been discipling got to lead younger kids in songs, Bible stories, and games each week. We spent time with the older kids on a different night playing soccer and studying the life of David. The summer culminated in an in-house camp for about 23 of the teen boys where we studied questions that they will face from other religions. One highlight was seeing Samuel realize for the first time that Jesus is God in the flesh! Pray for 4 of these teens starting college this semester and for new teen leaders to emerge from the group this year. Pray for the younger kids as they struggle with alcoholic fathers, the difficulties of


online school, the inability to gather as a church, and the vision to grow into disciple-makers.

Heidi enjoyed time each week with the teen girls. Extra volunteers allowed them to divide into two groups as they went swimming or hung out and kept discussing Bible stories about Jesus. Thanks for your prayers for this group. Unfortunately, at the end of the summer the girls said that they were not allowed to return to the group because their families disliked the Christian evangelistic emphasis. Seeing the girls blocked from the group is discouraging, but I'm thankful for the Christian women who sacrificed

over a two year period to provide a loving and Christ-centered place for these gals and got to share stories from the Bible that covered Creation to the Cross.

Fall has continued with a new set of volunteers helping with soccer and Bible study with the Congolese teens each Thursday. We are looking to broaden our online ministry to reach the lost through their phones.

Thanks for your support and prayers. Most missionaries are having a hard time with the uncertainties of life, difficulties in planning, and difficulties in coming into contact with the lost in

For those who may be unaware, Collegiate Impact is a network of local churches and on-campus ministries working together to bring the gospel to over 70,000 Kansas City area college students from 17 colleges.

Just like other ministries and churches, we have had to navigate the challenges of Covid-19. Last March all of our oncampus Bible Studies went online. While virtual interactions certainly have drawbacks, one positive was that we were able to connect students from different colleges to one another. It is through these new connections that God led two of our students to surrender their lives to Jesus. Praise God for His faithfulness in the midst of difficult circumstances!

Over the summer months, in addition to continuing virtual



Bible studies, our ministry hosted monthly outdoor events at different Collegiate Impact Partnering Churches. These social-distance-friendly events provided further opportunities to connect students to our ministry, to each other, and to local churches. I was pleased to see students not only communicate the fun they had at these events but the spiritual conversations they were able to have with both believers and not-yet-believers.



A new school year has begun, and once again, coronavirus has forced us to change our typical ministry approaches to connecting with new students. Instead of hosting our Welcome Week events on campuses, participating in student organization fairs, and helping residential students move into their dorm rooms; we have turned to social media as a way of engaging with Kansas City collegians. In early September we held a Free Virtual Raffle on our ministry's Instagram page, and 24 students expressed a desire to learn more about College Impact. We have followed up with them one-on-one to get to know their stories, have spiritual conversations, and invite them to join a Bible Study. Also in September we hosted our 2nd annual Fall Retreat. Students spent all of Saturday enjoying God's creation at Camp Del-Haven, worshipping Him in

song, receiving Biblical teaching, and having some good fun. The retreat serves as good opportunity for students to step back from the busyness of a new semester and be reminded of God's goodness and priority in their lives.

This school year we've welcomed Trey Barnett and Emma Clark to our staff who are participating in our one-year ministry internship. Trey recently received his Associate's Degree from Maple Woods Community College where he was also involved in our on-campus ministry. Now, he is pursuing an Organizational Leadership degree at Donnelly College where he is also working to launch an on-campus ministry. If you know of other Donnelly students who may be interested in helping us start a gospel ministry on the campus, please let us know. Emma is working with Carson Conover to further gospel ministry at Longview Community College.

We are grateful for God's provision and grace to our ministry during this unique time. Our desire is to bring the gospel to many more students this year. We would love your help in this! Student Ministry Report

Global Project 2020

Community college ministry is uniquely challenging in a number of ways. But, this kind of ministry also has its benefits. For example, students don't leave for the summer which presents an opportunity to train and equip student leaders for the fall semester. To that end, I recruited several student leaders to participate in the Global Project 2020—a virtual summer training program designed to deepen students' understanding of evangelism, discipleship, and mission. They joined a thousand other students each week to catch the vision from gifted communicators like David Platt, J.D. Greear, and Robby Gallaty. As a participant, students also joined a small group of other students for a weekly Discipleship Group. These groups met regularly for Bible study, prayer, and equipping. The Global Project proved to be a valuable training experience—one that we intend to participate in moving forward.

Fall Semester at MCC-Blue River/Longview

Because of COVID-19, all MCC classes have been moved to an online format. That means we were unable to engage in our usual new student outreach efforts on campus. This required us to make new contacts online. We reached out to contacts from last year and conducted gift card giveaways through Instagram to gather student contact information and gauge interest in our student ministry. We collected far fewer contacts than usual, but thankfully we were still able to launch a few online Bible studies that are meeting weekly. We have two Bible studies meeting on Mondays and a study on



every other weekday. Personally, I'm facilitating one of the Bible studies on Monday and I'm meeting biweekly with 3 other students to help them experience victory over the sin of pornographic lust. We're reading a book together called Finally Free to implement its practical, grace-centered strategies while memorizing Scripture and helping one another practice preventative accountability.

Leader Development

I'm also meeting online with our student leaders every Thursday at 11am. We use this time for prayer, stories, equipping, and planning. Recently, we've been using this time to train students in Gospel Appointments—a tool that mixes the best practices of relational evangelism and initiative evangelism using a three story framework (their story, your story, and God's story). We've asked students to write out their own personal testimony and we're equipping them to share the gospel via the 3 Circles gospel presentation. Our prayerful hope is that by doing this, we'll foster a stronger evangelistic culture among student leaders so we can reach and grow more students together.

Internship



INTRODUCING Emma Clark is a former MCC student, and member of my local church, who is now serving as an intern with me this year. She attended the Prospective Staff Weekend last year hosted by MBCollegiate and stepped through the subsequent training process. She spent the summer support-raising and is now giving the year to full-time collegiate ministry. I have the privilege of serving as her supervisor to help coach and equip her along the way. As part of her internship, we're participating in a 10-month equipping cohort through the Campus Multiplication Network to provide her with ongoing training. We're doing this with 172 other collegiate ministry leaders in 11 different countries!

Access to the refugee camps is limited due to the Covid 19 scare. They are keeping a very close eye on everyone who tries to enter as well as the refugees. Thousands of masks were donated from Food for the Hungry and we could not be more grateful! God is so good and surprises us all the time in His provision.





We are so thankful to have communication with the team weekly so we can learn about needs and prayer requests in Ethiopia. It has been so hard not being there in person so this really lifts our spirits to stay in contact and hear their voices.

The Lord has continued to bring church members closer together from different locations while the enemy has been attacking. We continue to pray for strength, encouragement, clarity, vision and health so they may carry on what the Lord's plan is in their lives.

RESOURCING CHURCHES AND EQUIPPING LEADERS

What a year this has been! I know that I've been really busy most every week and accomplished some significant things since my last report, but at first try none of them are coming back to me because they are all overshadowed by Covid-19. I actually had Covid-19 flu the first 10 days of August and while I don't recommend you getting it, it wasn't nearly as severe as the regular flu.

Really, over the past several months I have spent a lot of time concerned about and praying for you. Ministry is hard enough during normal times; add to all of this Covid-19, church shut-downs, declining attendance and offerings, members dividing over the appropriate response to Covid, having to plan ministry day to day rather than months ahead, and a political election year with uncivil discourse at toxic levels, and you have a recipe for fatigue, burnout, and anxiety among both pastors and church members.

But, "His grace is sufficient" regardless of the trial we are facing and we have seen the bold, persevering

faith of God's people like never before. Pastors and churches rapidly adapted to the new reality and showed amazing resourcefulness and tenacity. We kept our chin up and encouraged those around us who were about to give in to total despair. We will not know until we step into heaven just how great was the impact our churches upon our nation and neighborhoods during the national crisis. I stand in awe once more at the amazing grace of God and the faithfulness of His people in stepping up to meet this challenge.

Dr. Hammer and I have been attempting to minister to our churches and pastors in creative ways. When we realized that church shutdowns might be on the horizon, Dr. Hammer purchase four FM transmitters and all of the Lord's Supper service he could find online to be used by BR-KC churches. That proved to be a smart move in a short time as you could not find an FM transmitter or Lord's Supper elements online for several weeks due to Covid-related shortages. Several of our churches utilized the FM transmitters and held drive-up services when meeting in person in our church buildings wasn't possible. Starting in the spring, the Association began a weekly zoom call



for pastors to share needs and ideas with one another (these calls are still on-going), we consulted with




churches, brainstormed with pastors and kept attorneys Michael and Jonathan Whitehead busy interpreting the everchanging health announcements coming from Jackson County, Cass County and KCMO governments. These health edicts were often vague, complicated, and contradictory. They were also unequally applied so that churches were given much more confining limits than those offered to other similar businesses and organizations. Jonathan Whitehead petitioned the county authorities and was successful at getting equal treatment for our churches.

After a time, we realized the level of stress that leading through Covid-19 was causing our pastors so we compiled a list of vacation spots and retreat centers for pastors that are free or nearly free. We reminded our pastors of the arrangement we have with Diakonos Christian counseling services whereby pastors and their families can get 7 sessions of professional counseling at drastically reduced cost. We have encouraged pastors to do good self-care during these times so they can go the distance.

On another front, the new Disaster Relief Team lead by Roger Masters has been busy. They have taken work trips to St. Joseph, Iowa, and Louisiana. We are proud of the work and sacrifice of this team of volunteers and encourage you to consider getting trained as a DR team member so you can be a part of this vital ministry. Check out the incredible work our MBC Disaster Relief teams did in 2019 (https://mobaptist.org/dr/dr-service-statistics/).

I was blessed to serve as interim pastor for nearly 4 months at Grace Family Fellowship in Pleasant Hill while they were waiting on their new pastor to get moved here from Spokane, Washington. They called a solid young pastor but Covid-19 delayed his move. I always appreciate the time with different churches and the new life-long friends I make in each interim pastorate. The church blessed me in so many ways in the short few months I was with them. Another way we like to serve our churches is by covering the pulpit while their pastor is on sabbatical. One of our churches took us up on our offer to cover their pulpit for free while their pastor was on sabbatical leave for 7 weeks. Additionally, I have preached in dozens of our BR-KC churches while the pastor was on vacation. I am usually free to preach for our pastors when they need to be away, so don't hesitate to call me if you need someone in your absence, pastors.

Just a reminder: October is Pastor Appreciation month. If you have any part in the planning of your church's Pastor Appreciation event, I strongly encourage you to get creative and to be as generous with your pastoral staff as you can possibly be. Covid has been exhausting and extremely mentally taxing for your pastor; if ever there was a criti-



cal time to do something special for your pastor/s it is now. If your pastor has served your church for at least 5 years, consider allowing him to take a sabbatical of five to seven weeks with pay to recharge his spiritual batteries for ministry. Trust me, you will get a better, rejuvenated pastor back after a sabbatical. It literally might be the difference between keeping or losing your pastor. BR-KC Association has budgeted to cover the cost of your church's supply preacher while you allow your pastor to be on sabbatical, so the church does not incur any extra expenses. Alternatively, if Dr. Hammer and I are available, we would be happy to provide pulpit supply as well at no expense to the church. Whatever you do, do something generous and special for your pastor/s this October during Pastor Appreciation Month! They need it and deserve it! Your church will reap the benefits of a happier, more productive pastor/s.

Restoration House of Greater Kansas City



Since last report there have been a lot of wonderful changes. Adapting to Covid-19 has not been without its challenges, yet both Restoration House's Adult Program and Home for Minors are now flourishing.

Unfortunately, the Covid-19 pandemic had an adverse affect on our staff and program. Donations decreased in the spring forcing us to make staff reductions. With the help of our key partners and board

members, R|H developed a plan to respond and recover from the current pandemic. We are now getting back on track thanks to generous donors and volunteers.

In May of 2019, Restoration House was gifted seven



acres of property formerly known as East Lynn Baptist Church. Staff went to work coordinating efforts to transform the property into what is now known as Restoration House Farms. Once the renovations were done and the quarantine period was lifted, we welcomed 5 women into our new home and program! All the women are experiencing hope and healing as only God can provide: We have two women who have started CNA training; one working on her GED; another has started a job; several are working on family reconciliation; and all are feeling loved and cared for by the incredible staff and volunteers.



Here is what a few of our current residents had to say about Restoration House...

"I'm thankful for Restoration House because since coming here I have a restored sense of hope and I now know what it feels like to have a family."

"I am loved. Thankful for a new beginning! Jeremiah 29:11"

"Restoration House is a way to build your solid foundation and your relationship with God and healing!

So get ready to overcome!"

By having this property, we were able to add small animal and horticultural therapies to our holistic pro-



gram. Currently we house 4 Nigerian Dwarf goats and 2 Boar goats whom the ladies adore. We also raise over twenty chickens that will provide them with plenty of eggs. This summer the girls cultivated a garden in which they were able to harvest and can fresh fruits and vegetables.

We have also expanded our Healing Arts program to include handcrafting cold process soaps, sugar scrubs, candles and stainless-steel tumblers, all of which are sold at Rehope Market and Café. This coffee shop, located at 808 W. Main Street in Greenwood, is an extension of Restoration House and will provide sup-

port to the mission of healing and restoring victims of human trafficking.

In November 2019 Restoration House opened its Home for Minors. This home holds up to 7 minor girls from ages 11-17.

We are planning for the future. With the Lord's leading, we are cultivating several partnerships that will add breadth and depth to the services of Restoration House and allow us to impact even more minors and adults. Stay tuned for more details as the partnerships and plans emerge.

In the meantime, make plans now for the 7th Annual Hope Now Freedom Gala scheduled for January 30, 2021. We will be holding our event either in-person or virtually and are currently looking for sponsors as well as silent auction item donations. Disaster Relief

Below is a list of statistics. Behind the dates and numbers are real people. Before the statistics are three snapshots into these lives.

People like an elderly couple in St. Joseph, Missouri. He is a Veteran, a lifetime of military service. Now, he can barely





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walk. A flood had filled his basement. He could not make the countless trips up and down the stairs required to rid his basement of the soggy carpet, waterlogged warped furniture, a lifetime of accumulations, the layer of mud and debris flood waters left behind. He could not check to see if precious mementos were salvageable. He was distraught with concern. A team Chaplain brought assurance and calmness. Prized possessions were located and accounted for. The door opened for a spiritual conversation. Decisions were made long ago to follow Jesus. There was a love and appreciation for Him. The days of church attendance had long passed due to health issues. A reminder, a refocus of perspective from the things seen to the eternal unseen things brought the peace that was lacking.

People like an elderly man in lowa recovering from major ankle surgery. A huge tree crashed down on his back porch and yard. It was difficult for him to watch, feeling helpless as the team went to work.

Upon presenting him with a Large Print Bible signed by the team he was told of the love God has for him, of the value he has. He was told God has a purpose for him. "Even with a body messed up this much?" He asked as he pointed to his bandaged ankle. "Yes", we assured him. He was asked "Is there a time in your life when you decided to follow Jesus?" He replied "No. But, I think that is something I need to do. I have been thinking of that a lot lately. Even before this storm. Even before this. (pointing at his ankle). I have been thinking of it a whole lot!" The storm brought with it a bridge to the gift of God which was shared simply. He gladly took the offer to have someone from the local church connect with him, to share more with him.





People like a man in Louisiana who came into the Incident Command Center not knowing how to express his real need. Each time he began to speak, the words stuck in his throat. The reality was his house was beyond repair. A multi-generational family home. The night before there had been a hard, driving rain. He went to the upper floor to try to salvage some things as water poured in through the hole from a tree laying on the roof. He searched to find anything he could save that was his mothers. Some decorative dolls crumbled in his hands. The old floors could not stand up to the massive amounts of water brought during and after Hurricane Laura. His leg went through the floor. It was hopeless.

Everyone in his family always looked to him for the answers, how to fix things, what to do. This was beyond him. He couldn't "fix" this. He was in tears. The house served as a bridge for a much-needed conversation that led to two of us sitting with him on the front row in the church sanctuary with beautiful stained glass before us. He talked, we listened. He came into that building weighed down by all the cares of the world pressing in on him. He laid them at the feet of Jesus. He walked out with a spring in his step, a smile on his face, and a deter-

mination to get back into fellowship with a body of believers, no longer letting the "busyness" of life separate him from a relationship with the Lord.

It is about more than statistics. It is about bringing help, hope, and healing in the name of Jesus.

One more important mention is that of the opportunity of the summer College Intern team. In our association we are blessed to have a few who have served in this capacity. Maddy Atwell has a college degree in Disaster Relief. She is the leader of these teams. Evan Allen has been an internship participant. One of us had the blessing of working alongside Maddy as the White Hat (Incident Command leader) and Evan, along with another internship participant on the IC team in DeRidder, LA. Another participant served as an Assessor that week. A few of us have also had the pleasure of working alongside Evan on a chainsaw team in lowa and in DeRidder, LA. They all served with skill and excellence. We whole-

heartedly recommend this opportunity for young people to take part in the summer College Intern program. This is an amazing way to equip and enable young people to become involved in DR ministry. They are highly effective and energetic. They are our future. One does not know what one is capable of unless someone gives them the opportunity. It is a Biblical responsibility of the older generation to teach the younger. Why would a church not want to share this opportunity with their students? This has been a very unusual year at the Multiethnic Church Planting Center. Covid-19 forced us to refocus our efforts. Instead of developing regular community outreach activities, in the last few months we have focused our attention and time on helping pastors and leaders of our international churches how to navigate in these times of uncertainty. With the assistance of some people knowledgeable about technology, we were able to assist and help churches, not only in the Kansas City area, but around the state

in how to get the right equipment to offer online activities for their members, how to use social media, and streaming their activities on line

Following the example of our association, we scheduled weekly online meetings with pastors around the state helping them to deal with the challenges of their local ministries. When the time was right, we helped international churches developing guidelines to restart services in their buildings; in addition, we provided direction on how to develop drive-in services and if needed, with the assistance of our association, we made the necessary equipment available to those churches.



We also provided regular encouragement and emotional support to some pastors and leaders who tested positive for coronavirus. Thank God they all recuperated fine from the disease. Even though this time has been incredibly challenging, God has used these struggles to produce unity among our pastors and leaders. We are grateful for God's mercy and care in the midst of a pandemic. He is faithful!



This time has also helped us to better understand some of the needs that international pastors and leaders have, and we have been exploring specific and practical ways we can help them to fulfill these needs. We will be scheduling several training events, and opportunities for professional development and fellowship that they can be part of, some before the end of the year continuing into 2021. As part of this effort we would like to make available to some of these pastors the basic theological training they might need to be better equipped to fulfill their pastoral responsibilities. We are also developing a church planting track seminary training for those leaders who feel called to plant new churches.

With the assistance of our association and its churches, we have committed ourselves to help our pastors and leaders of all the international churches in the Kansas City area to become more successful in their specific ministries.

We will finish the year strong with some outreach activities for the community including an eyeglass clinic, an event for Hispanic pastors and leaders, and two other gatherings for international people interested in

learning about other people groups and beliefs. We are grateful that little by little we are returning to normality. We are grateful for the churches and the leaders of our association because during these difficult times they have walked with us every step of the way and had empowered us to minister to the international pastors and leaders in our community. For all of that, we give thanks to God. We look forward to 2021!


